Welcome and Introductions

Presentations

Gretta provided basic information about the programs at HERE of Jackson County. The clients need to call themselves; an agency is not able to do this for them. She mentioned that the programs are available to residents in the seven western counties as well as Madison County. The only program only open to Jackson County residents is the shelter program. The shelter program kicks in on nights when the temperature drops to 32 degrees or lower according to the National Weather Service. It runs from November 1st to March 31st. Individuals are housed at the Golden Eagle in Whittier while families are housed in the Economy Inn in Sylva. The length of the stay can be up to 28 days and can be expanded. Clients do need to leave if the temperature does up and then recall should they need shelter when the temperature drops again.

One staff member does street outreach making sure those unsheltered have all the necessities needed based on the time of the year such as sunscreen during the summer and lip balm during the winter. Special circumstances such as being elderly or having children can move someone into shelter above someone else.

Another program available is the rapid housing program. This provides paying rent for up to 24 months, paying security deposit as well as utility deposits. If someone has Section 8 housing only the security deposit is made as Sect. 8 will pay the rent. This program serves about 3 clients. It is to prevent homelessness.

Paul oversees a different rapid housing program. The client needs to get permanent housing authorization and then the search for housing starts. The program pays rent and utilities for up to 12 months. Employment or disability is worked on and any medical needs. Currently funding allows for about 54 clients with 42 currently enrolled.
